



They all follow the EYFS Curriculum, learning through purposeful play and engaging activities in indoor and outdoor classrooms. Our EYFS endeavour's to create an active and stimulating learning environment to give your child the best start possible start in life.


The KS1 (Key Stage 1) is made up of our Year 1 and Year 2 Classes. They follow the KS1 Curriculum, learning through structured lesson planning in assigned classrooms. Our KS1 Qualified Teachers create a safe and engaging environment to help your child enjoy coming to school each day. Where they will learn phonics, reading, writing, and math.

The KS2 (Key Stage 2) is made up of our Year 3, Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6 Classes. They follow the KS2 Curriculum, learning through structured lesson planning in assigned classrooms. Our KS2 Qualified Teachers plan engaging, interesting lessons in a range of subjects to widen your child's knowledge and abilities.

Early Years Curriculum

St Martin's follow the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum. There are 7 areas of learning which give the children broad and varied curriculum, setting firm foundations for their learning throughout their school and the rest of their lives.

Areas of learning

3 Prime areas give them skills for learning

- Communication and Language
- Physical Development
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development

4 Specific areas give them opportunities to apply their skills, and to explore and learn further

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

Many of the Areas of Learning are interlinked and so the activities that your child will engage in will cover many areas!

Characteristics of Effective Learning

Within Nursery and Reception we strive to cultivate children's natural curiosity for learning through developing the characteristics of Effective Learning including:

- Playing and Exploring children investigate and experience things, and 'have a go.'
- Active Learning children concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties.
- Creating and Thinking Critically children develop their own ideas, make links and develop strategies for doing things.
- Developing values of kindness and respect for others.

There are many different stages of development within each Area of Learning. All staff within the EYFS are able to identify learning opportunities to meet the needs of each child as an individual. Activities are planned and supported to nurture and ensure every child will progress during their time in the EYFS. As well as planned activities we value each child's interests and ideas ensuring every moment is a learning moment.



The KS1 (Key Stage 1) Curriculum

In KS1 we start to cover a wider range of subjects and subject matter with lessons in place that are inspiring and engaging, encouraging a passion for learning. The curriculum is mapped out to ensure that the lessons are structured and accessible to pupils at all levels to ensure they are able to progress individually and as a group.

Phonics

At St Martin's children are first introduced to the skills of reading and writing during engaging, active and differentiated phonic lessons which follow the 'Read, Write, Inc' scheme. Adhering to a systematic approach, the children are taught a new sound each day, which is modelled by the teacher and then applied to spelling, reading and writing activities. Our phonics provision strives to develop children into fluent and confident readers, whose skills enable them to successfully access the wider curriculum.

Guided Reading

In Key Stage one the children participate in daily guided reading sessions. These sessions allow children to be exposed to a wide range of high quality, diverse and modern texts which include all genres. It is during these lessons that the children work beyond the reading of word and focus on reading for meaning and understanding and therefore broadening their knowledge of a wide range of topics. Children progress to Key Stage two with a rich and vast vocabulary bank.

Literacy

Literacy lessons are a core aspect of the Key Stage one curriculum. Each lesson is planned for with reference to the year group expectations outlined in The National Curriculum. These lessons form part of our broad and balanced approach to learning as they are linked to the topics that children are discovering within History and Geography, with the aim of deepening and strengthening pupil's knowledge and understanding. Children are introduced to a new writing skill each week and are provided with opportunities to apply these skills within their extended piece of writing, otherwise known as their 'Big Write'.

Maths

At St Martin's we have adopted a mastery approach towards the teaching of Maths. Lessons are creatively planned to encourage the development of independent, autonomous and inquisitive pupils who are able to use concrete resources and a wide range of strategies to solve mathematical problems. All lessons aim to provide a real life context to ensure that the children are able to apply their skills and understanding beyond the classroom. The following topics are taught within the Key Stage one curriculum: number, addition and subtraction, shape and patterns, time, measure, multiplication and division and money.

The KS1 (Key Stage 1) Curriculum

Science

Science in Key Stage one is an opportunity for our pupils at St Martin's to demonstrate and apply their curious and inquisitive nature. All lessons involve a practical aspect in which discovery learning is encouraged and pupils are supported in posing their own scientific questions. Pupils participate in investigations and experiments to enable them to develop their scientific enquiry skills. The following topics are taught within the Key Stage one curriculum:

Wider Curriculum

These subjects are taught on a weekly basis and children will discover a new unit of learning each half term. The following topics form our wider curriculum in Key Stage one:

The KS2 (Key Stage 2) Curriculum

In KS2 we start to gain more understanding and knowledge into the subject matter and we start to explore the wider world. We cover a range of subjects and subject matter with lessons in place that encourage pupils to grow. Inspiring and engaging lessons using a wide range of learning materials. The curriculum is mapped out to ensure that the lessons are structured and accessible to pupils at all levels to ensure they are able to progress individually and as a group.

Our curriculum is planned to be not only educational, but also enjoyable for both pupils and staff. The school day is carefully planned to ensure children gain maximum benefit through an exciting curriculum and other extra curricular activities. Our staff have a wealth of experience and knowledge and lessons are alive with challenge and involvement for all. Children demonstrate an interest and a keen approach to learning and this is encouraged through the carefully planned curriculum for all. Through the School Council, pupils have a voice that is heard.

The foundation stones to a successful education lie in the acquisition of basic skills. Without these skills, children will not make the educational progress that is expected of them. At St. Martin's C.E. Primary School, we place great emphasis on learning basic skills. We hold the Basic Skills Quality Mark award for recognition of the school's work in Basic Skills. Children will be taught and expected to learn number bonds and times tables, as well as calculation methods for the four rules of number. In addition, children will be taught phonics, through the use of the Read Write Inc programme, basic spelling rules and reading skills. Our reading scheme is 'Big Cat' which provides a variety of texts to challenge the pupils. Our aim is that when pupils leave Year Six, they will be highly numerate and literate, with a real joy for learning.

ICT is also central to the curriculum and is integrated into a range of subjects. The school is well resourced with Interactive Whiteboards in all teaching rooms, which allows us to create visually stimulating lessons and greater opportunities for interactive learning. In addition the school has a computer suite of 30 computers and class sets of laptops to be used.

Embedded in our curriculum as a way of nurturing children to access basic skills through different learning styles as well as challenging themselves further in different areas, are the Arts. We value the Arts for their intrinsic quality, promoting self esteem, leadership opportunities and providing an interesting stimulus for all areas. Aside from regular PE/dance, art, technology and music lessons, many art forms, including drama are used in other areas – facilitated by our creative curriculum. In addition to this, we organise a number of themed weeks throughout the year which enable children to work alongside professional artists or organisations. One World Week, for example, encourages inclusiveness and cultural diversity in every curriculum area.



SEND Provision

It is by investing time, resources and support that every child will be able to achieve their full potential. We will accept all children at St Martin's, whatever their special educational needs. There will be no barriers to entry.

Understanding and including all differences and challenges individuals face are a key factor in being able to provide an accessible learning platform for individuals to grow and develop and overcome their learning barriers. At St Martins it is important to us that we are able to provide educational provisions that help and support all our pupils, including the individual and unique challenges some pupils are in need of.

Provisions in place to help to support pupils with Special Educational Needs include:

- Specialised sensory room and OT room.
- Trained 1-1 support staff for pupils with 1-1 needs.
- Adapting lessons to include pupils with mild special educational needs.
- Visual learning aids to help support individual learning abilities.
- A robust curriculum that includes additional support, so it can be accessed by pupils with a range of needs.
- Sessions to help with speech and language, social communications are held on site with trained specialised teachers to help with a wide range of mild special needs including ASD, Dyslexia and Social Communication needs.
- Support with Educational Health Care Plans for pupils that will require additional supports to access the curriculum.

Spiritual Development

As part of the LDBS Frays Academy Trust, St Martin's Primary School is founded primarily on the Christian principles of respect for one and another, honesty and self-reflection.

School Values are nominated by the class teacher and LSA and are given out during our weekly Worship Celebration Assemblies, parents are invited along to share in the success of these achievements.

What St Martin's can offer?

- As a Church of England school, a Christian ethos is at our heart and our school values of Respect, Compassion, Generosity, Forgiveness, Perseverance, Courage, Justice and Trust are promoted throughout everything we do in school.
- Our class sizes are on average 25 pupils per class, with a maximum of 30 pupils per class, this is to allow for a calm and interactive learning environment, with a strong focus on learning.
- The school's Breakfast Club provides a social and positive start to their day. The children can choose from a range of food items including cereal, toast, a range of fruit and juices. A range of activities are on offer to keep the children engaged and for them to enjoy.
- School Meals are freshly prepared onsite to ensure that your child has a hot healthy meal each day competitively priced. This provision is free for Y1 & Y2 pupils as part of a government funded scheme.
- Pupils have access to a range of extra-curricular clubs and activities that are offered at lunchtimes and after school all year round free of charge. These range from sports clubs, such as Dance, Dodgeball and football.
- The school has a pro-active PTA group who organise and arrange a number of community events for parents to be involved in throughout the academic year, to help to raise funds for a variety of exciting projects that take place each year.
- Our School Governors' are an active part of our school community life here at St Martin's and push for excellence. They have a broad spectrum of skills and attributes that enrich the offerings to pupils attending St Martin's.
- As we are part of the Fray's Trust, who have a family of seven C.E Primary Academies St Martin's has access to valuable resources and staff trainings. The Trust expects high standards within its family of Academies and offers support and guidance to ensure education standards are producing the best results for its pupils and the communities that it serves.



The school's work to support pupils' personal development is carefully planned and reinforced, for example through high-quality and attractive displays around the school. Pupils enjoy making contributions and said that their ideas are listened to.





Admissions to St Martin's C.E Primary School

Nursery Places – September 2022 – Starting Nursery September 2022

Nursery Children who are born between 1st September 2018 and 31st August 2019 will be admitted to Nursery in September 2022. There are a maximum of 60 places available in Nursery (currently organized as 18 places for 15 hours per week AM only, 18 for 15 hours per week PM only and 12 places of 30 hours per week). Reception Places – September 2022 - Starting School September 2022 Each year, the School admits a maximum of 60 pupils in Reception. There are 60 full-time places for children in each year from Reception through to Year 6. Parents must apply for Reception school places via their local authority. Offers of school places for Reception starting September 2022 will be made by London Borough of Hillingdon School Admissions Team.

IN-Year Admissions

Parents wishing to apply for a place at St Martin's CE Primary School, other than September start, should complete the School's application form and return it to the School. The form will be reviewed by members of the governing body, and a place will be offered if available. If a place is not available, parents will be given the option of being placed on a waiting list. Details of all in-year applications will be shared with London Borough of Hillingdon. Parents may also complete the common application form available from London Borough of Hillingdon, listing St Martin's CE Primary School as one of their preferences.
